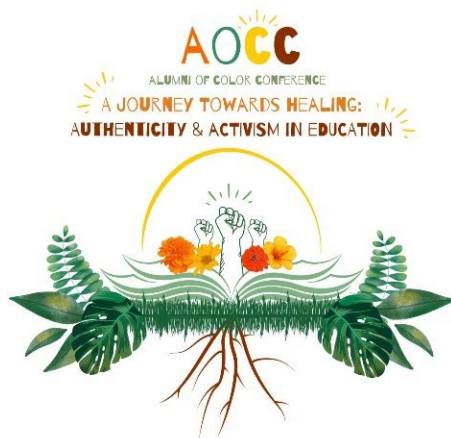
Gutman Library Book Talk - *Making Americans: Stories of Historic Struggles, New Ideas, and Inspiration in Immigrant Education*

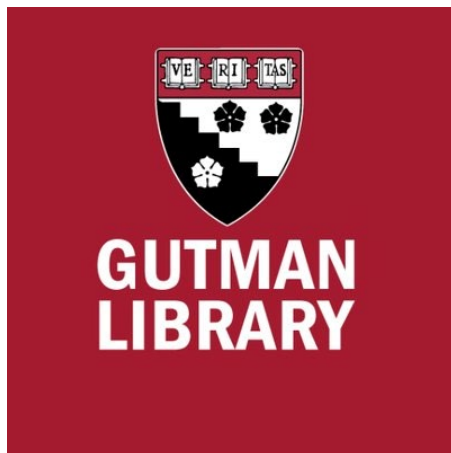
