The Problem: Despite recent state legislation requiring mental health education, a tremendous policy to practice gap remains. School communities are struggling with implementation, primarily due to a lack of knowledge and confidence about a topic that has traditionally never been included in the curriculum.

A Foundational Part of the Solution: The MHLA created a one-hour certification program called MHL Aware that offers foundational information about mental health literacy (MHL). This offers educators the knowledge and confidence they need to take the next steps toward effectively

implemetning MHL into their school communities.

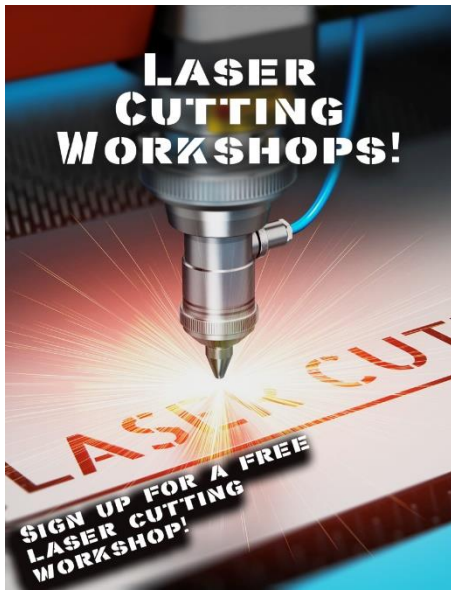

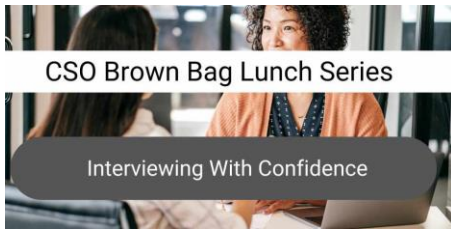

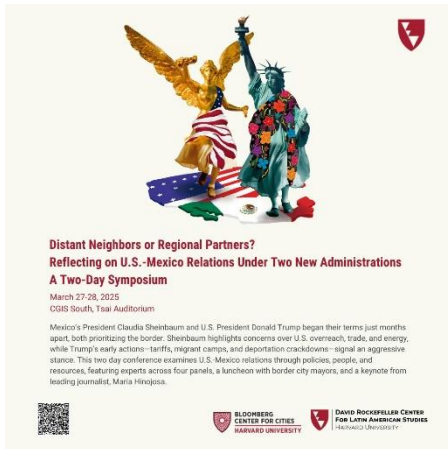

Student Orations Competition for Harvard Commencement

The Orations Competition is among the oldest and most treasured traditions associated with Harvard's Commencement.

Three students are chosen by a panel of judges to deliver, from memory, an address to the assembly of approximately 32,000, which includes members of the governing boards, honorary degree recipients, faculty, parents, alumni and of course: the graduates themselves.

About the orations

- The first of these orations is delivered in Latin by a graduating senior from the College;
- The second, in English, is also delivered by a graduating senior from the College; and
- The third is delivered by a degree candidate from the University's graduate or professional Schools.

Being selected as one of the three orators is regarded as one of the highest honors a student can achieve. While these orations originally involved a student defending their thesis, the range of topics has since expanded to reflect a variety of perspectives and themes related to Harvard and the global community.

Thomas Dee is the Barnett Family Professor at Stanford University's Graduate School of Education, a Research Associate at the National Bureau of Economic Research, and the Faculty Director of the John W. Gardner Center for Youth and Their Communities. His research focuses largely on the use of quantitative methods to inform contemporary issues of public policy and practice. This talk discusses tracking models in U.S. classrooms, specifically setting higher expectations for the lowest-performing students coupled with aligned teacher supports.

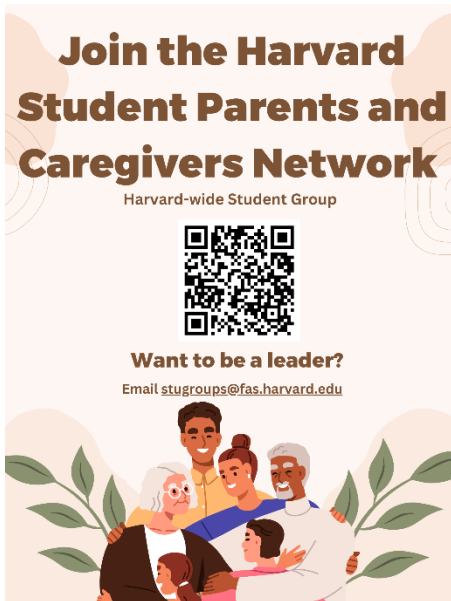

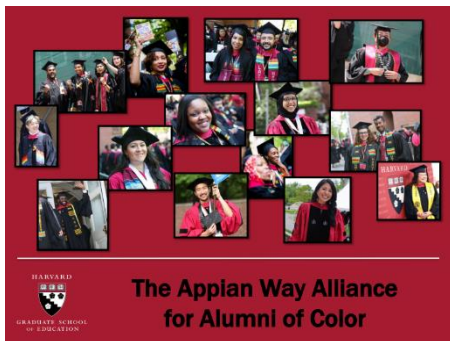
Academic Coach will run the accountability group and will be there to provide structure and any immediate support needed by students.
