Preparing for the Quantitative Job Search

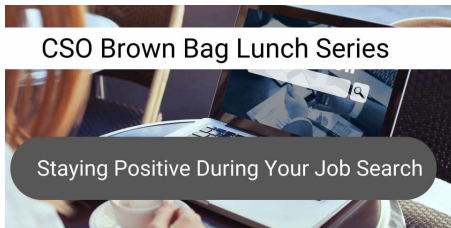
