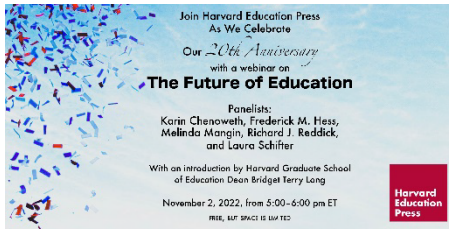

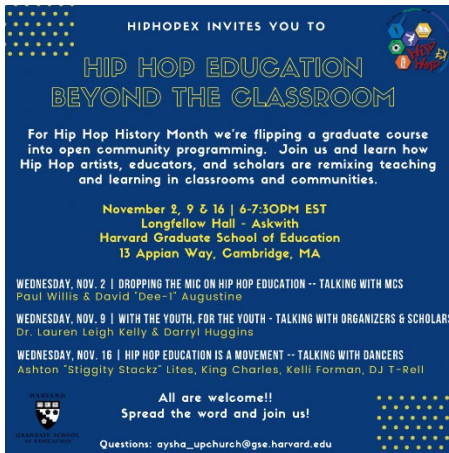

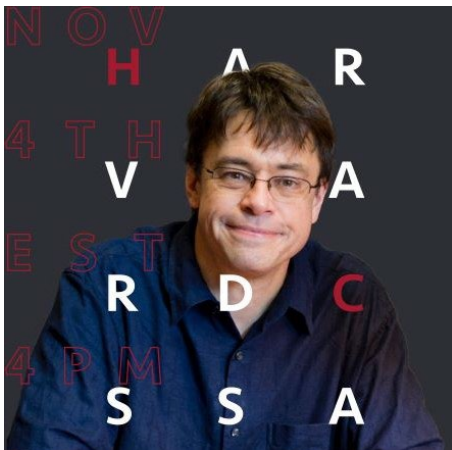

Play, Learn, Grow: How a Hong Kong startup designed play- and skill-based learning experiences through the pandemic

When Press Start Academy, an education startup developing 21st-century skills in K-12 students through play and games, was founded in December 2019 on the back of six turbulent months in Hong Kong, it had no idea that its growth journey would still be full of obstacles ahead.

Since then, the Press Start team has endured wave after wave of covid-induced challenges, forcing them to go back to the drawing board repeatedly, reexamining its analogue play and game-based approach to education in the pandemic era of online and hybrid learning, and pivoting multiple times along the way.

In his visit to Harvard, Founder and CEO Vince Siu will be bringing a treasure trove of stories, hardships and triumphs from this rollercoaster ride. Join us for an introspective hour of lessons learned, new wisdom gained and next steps identified, and learn insights from the field on game, instructional and facilitation design!

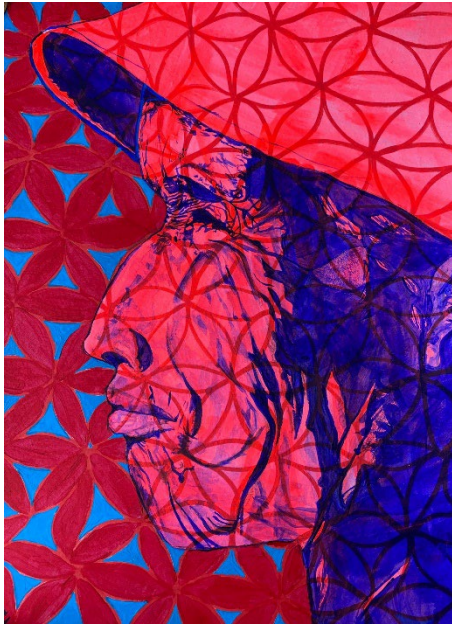


Exhibit Progression of a Creative Mind, Osnat Siñani:

It is the progression of a creative mind in three different series. The first ‘Madonne’ depicts naked Aymara women with different body shapes calling upon their sensual energy to confront the desexualization of native women and the view of them as only a workforce in Bolivia. The second ‘Metamorphosis’ is black and white paintings portraying an ode to her ancestors. Finally, ‘Their Glances’ is a series of Aymara faces liberated from the folkloric perspective, incarnating vibrant colors and establishing the idea that indigenous peoples are not only the caretakers of Mother Earth but human beings with the potential for both great evil and goodness, idealizing them is dehumanizing them.”

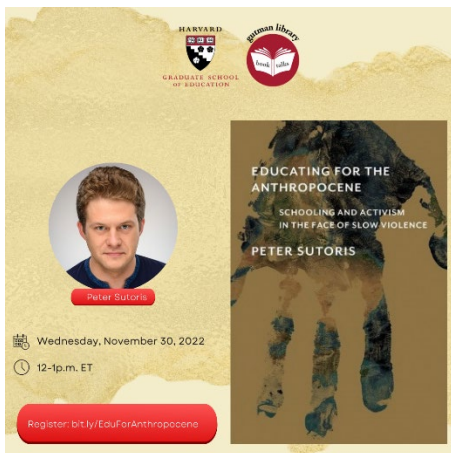

Gutman Library Virtual Book Talk - Educating for the Anthropocene: Schooling and Activism in the Face of Slow Violence

Join us as we welcome author Peter Sutoris, Environmental Anthropologist, Lecturer (Assistant Professor) in Education at University of York, and Honorary Senior Research Associate at University College London. Education has never played as critical a role in determining humanity's future as it does in the Anthropocene, an era marked by humankind's unprecedented control over the natural environment. Drawing on a multisited ethnographic project among schools and activist groups in India and South Africa, Peter Sutoris explores education practices in the context of impoverished, marginal communities where environmental crises intersect with colonial and racist

histories and unsustainable practices. Sutoris highlights an innovative research methodology of participatory observational filmmaking, describing how films made by children in the Indian and South African communities provide a window into the ways that young people make sense of the future of the Anthropocene. It is through their capacity to imagine the world differently, Sutoris argues, that education can reinvent itself.

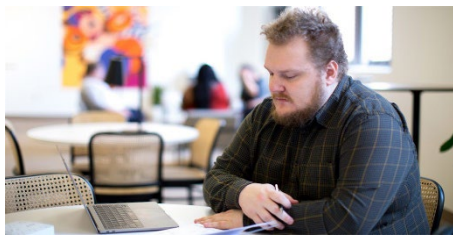

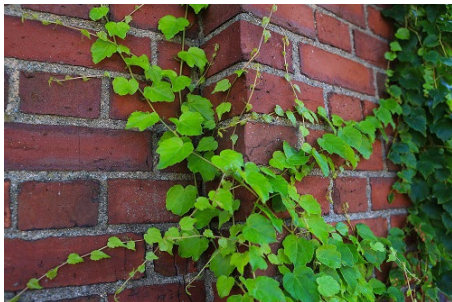

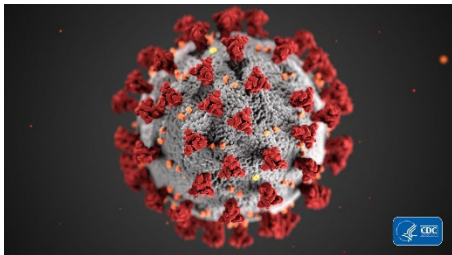
The health and safety of our community members, their families, and the public remain a top priority. Please check out our current policies and procedures, especially what to do if you test positive for COVID-19.



Reminder to Report Positive COVID Test Results through Crimson Clear

Students should report positive COVID test results immediately through [Crimson Clear](#). (If you use the Harvard Color testing system, this will be done automatically.) Reporting this information is essential for our ability to monitor health conditions in our community, and doing so will prompt Harvard University Health Services (HUHS) to contact you via your Harvard email to provide guidance on treatment options and next steps, including instructions about isolation and notifying your close contacts. You are also encouraged to complete the self-assessment form on Crimson Clear if you are experiencing symptoms or would like guidance after a potential exposure to COVID.

In the event that you must isolate, you must also notify your instructors of any necessary absences from class, though you do not need to share your specific COVID diagnosis. The Office of Student Affairs also stands ready to offer support in contacting instructors and getting access to care if you contact them.
