

Whitney Warren (HGSE '23) is the Chief Education Officer at Building Tomorrow, a community-powered organization that brings foundational literacy and numeracy and SEL programming to learners in rural Uganda. She serves as a consultant for the World Bank, where she currently is leading a qualitative study on early primary dropout and repetition in East Timor. Whitney also works with Research Schools International, where she leads a project in collaboration with the International Baccalaureate that is delivering a year-long collaborative action research course to teachers from over 70 different countries to measure perceptions of student wellbeing. 


### Work Accountability Groups
